run both lead and low Geel went out, necessitating a PFF drop on Koblens by lead. Low was separated from group formation in the clouds and brought back. High, with equipment working well, made a Geel drop on the primary at Werlshstein. Visual photos showed no ground detail. However, plotted scope pictures indicated beam hits in target areas.

Leager, low and to the rear flank was encountered at both targets after beams away indicating the effectiveness of chaff over an undercut. No enemy aircraft were observed. Battle damage was nil.

Mission was scrubbed.

Berlin - Capt. Hanson led the 300th with 32 aircraft plus 4 PFF as 40 "B". Backlog reported, before the H, that bombing would be by instruments. The route, however, was flown as briefed and all three s-wadrons attack on the General Engineering and Armament works of Schmiedel Bersig W.F. in the Northwest part of Berlin. A 10/10 undercut with tops to 23000 feet was the general coverage of the continent with occasional breaks. A large hole over the target gave the lead bombardier a chance for a visual correction 45 seconds before beams away. Flare blast hit him in the eye though and the navigator salvaged on the estimated elapsed time. Low dropped on lead and high made its own separate PFF run. Strike photos through the haze show hits in the woods and built up area to NE of target.

Moderate, accurate, tracking flank on the lead. High from one minute before to three minutes after beams away made the run difficult. Leager W.A. flare was encountered at Koblens in Holland. Damage: Lead, 5 severe, 1 slight, 1 missing; Low - 0; High, 2 slight, 1 missing.

W/c 903F, pilot 2nd Lt. Stettler of the 433rd was hit by flank just after beams away and was last seen going down over Berlin. Other members of the crew were 2nd Lt. A. Pauko, Jr. (CP), P/O G.W. Culbert, Jr. (M), 2nd Lt. W.G. Jevy (M), S/Sgt. D.M. Frenck (M), S/Sgt. R.H. Jarvis (TI), Sgt. E.H. Tachan (SM), Sgt. G.C. Laubach, Jr. (SM), Sgt. W.J. Schenbach (IG).

W/c 099-G, pilot 2nd Lt. G.F. Manning, of the 367th was last heard from sending SOS to Air Sea Rescue which was able to get a fix. This would indicate a possible ditching. However, the W/c was reported as outstanding. Other members of the crew include 2nd Lt. Paul Wilson (CP), 2nd Lt. M.T. Schneider (M), 2nd Lt. P. Tannenbaum (S), Sgt. V.H. Johnson (M), Sgt. F. Musser (TI), Sgt. H.L. Gille (BT), Sgt. E.H. Dewey (M), Sgt. J.A. Cox (TU). 2nd Lt. J.W. Marsh, pilot in the 300th, was killed in an unfortunate accident previous to the mission's take off. As the ball turret guns were being installed and tested, two bullets were discharged, one ricocheting off a brick wall and striking the victim.

Officers of the 300th Squadron held a stag party at the "A" mess during the evening. Though the abundance of Scotch whiskey was the main feature, extra musical and amusements entertainment was furnished. Among those present were Lt. Col. Eager, CO of the 300th, and Lt. Col. Rickman, Air Exec. of the 92nd, both formerly with the 300th.

6 Karlsruhe - Major Conkin, from the 40th CG, led the 300th with 36 1/2 inch 1st 4 FF as the 40th "A" group. A 10/10 undercast with occasional holes over the continent confirmed the target report to be high, to be by instruments. Each squadron made its own H2A run with unobserved results. Night non-persistent controls harassed the formation between 7,000 and 27,000 feet.

A moderate to intense, inaccurate barrage was in the cross trail was encountered in the target area. Damage on this, the 1st of the group is seven missions to date to Karlsruhe. War load, too slight; loss, none; high, too slight. There was no enemy fighter opposition.

9 Stuttgart - 300th, as 40 "A", flew 36 1/2 inch 1st 4 FF as the 40th "A" group. The group was forced south of Dresden 1, by other 1/2 to left, but this did not affect H2A run. As in "A", previous report there was a 10/10 coverage at the target which necessitated the beginning of a 10/10 run. 45 seconds before bombs away - hole through the clouds - ground lead considerable a visual correction. 1st search made separate FF run on target and high had a 40 second visual run. Strike photos showed no bomb strikes, although crews reported hits from the low to have been in the target area.

Major tracking H2A was very accurate on lead squadron. However, a barrage was ineffective on the group. Losses, all to lead, 1/2 to slight, 2 severe, and 1 missing.

1/2 1/2-0, pilot Lt. Frank of the 300th, was hit vertically. Severe damage to engine and cables, right - left ailerons, and to the tank lines rendered most controls useless. However, Lt. Frank finally managed to turn 1/2 to 1/2 of throttles and effected a landing at Mannheim. 1/2-0, ground and high patches as runner control cables with argument wires during pilot practice. Four 1/2-0's escorted 1/2 to friendly territory which highly increased crew.

1/2 300th, pilot Lt. W.H. Brown of the 300th, was hit over target and left formation under control. No damage and information has been received. Also on the ground 1st Lt. J. J. Dillie (1st), and Lt. 11 Frankfurt - Col. Sutton led 300th with 36 1/2 inch 1st 4 FF as the 40th "A" group. Captain M. J. Sullivan led 12 1/2 as 40 "B" high to large marshalling yards in Frankfurt. Due to complete coverage in target area, lead of "A" force made an H2A run. 1st high both dropped on lead. High of "B" made its own FF run. All results were unobserved. On the way back Division rerouted the wing northeast of course, which fact did not affect the mission.

1st fire was high at the target and no 1/2 were observed. The group suffered no damage.

1st Frank and his crew returned to base.

24 Nicksa - 306th flew twelve a/c including two PFF on load of 40 "B" and three a/c on high element 40 "B" high. Capt. Casseday led the formation. For the first time in many weeks the group had a completely visual run. The target, located at Nicksa, was an airfield and the object was to destroy the field. A rack malfunction in the lead ship forced a second run on which the deputy took over. Strike photos show the field covered with bursts indicating excellent results.

Three a/c were damaged slightly by AAA from the front lines. No P/A were observed.

Gleason - 306th as 40 "B" flew 34 a/c including four PFF led by Capt. Lopez. As Buckeye reported, visual conditions existed at the target, a hangar on the Gleason airfield. Lead bombardier felt that this aiming point had previously been hit, and therefore dropped his bombs on another installation. High squadron followed suit while the low pattern hit a built-up area to southwest of field. Results were described as good.

Major accurate tracking flak at the target and scattered bursts from the Koolenz area inflicted the following damage: Low, 1 severe; high, 2 severe. No fighter opposition was encountered.

Lt. Gen. Spaatz issued a commendation to the 306th Air Force for the fine job of bombing done on this day.

Because of the very dense haze and fog which blanketed our base, all 49 of the mission's a/c were diverted to other fields, mostly in eastern England. Christmas for those crews was a relatively miserable affair. However, most of the men were given good meals and as good quarters as could be expected. All extended their appreciation for what was done on their behalf.

25 Mission was scrubbed due to lack of crews and weather. Some men returned from diversion fields on trucks sent out from the base. They received a Christmas meal at 2000 hours.

The holiday was celebrated in typical army style with the exception of the food. Sufficient portions of turkey, dressing, ice cream, cake, cigars, etc were served. Everyone on the base had a stuffed stomach and the proper spirit prevailed during the day. Most operations were at a standstill because of poor weather but theoretically units were functioning as usual. Many expressed a desire and confidence that this conflict will be over before next Dec. 25.

27 Diverted a/c returned to base.

Siegburg and Koblenz - Capt. Hanson led the 306th as 40 "B" with 36 a/c including four PFF and one Gee H plus three spares. Buckeye's report that the bombing would be by instrument's caused the Gee H ship to take over at the IP. However, its bombs failed to release on the primary, marshalling yards at Siegburg, and therefore the lead made an HX run on Koblenz. Low did likewise. High dropped on smoke bombs of 40 "A" which attacked Siegburg. All results were unobserved.

No flak or enemy fighters hindered the group. On the return a/c 055-M, pilot Lt. Alcock, of 423rd, was seen near St. Albans with one engine smoking. Eight chutes were counted. Then the a/c crashed and exploded. Subsequent reports show that all on the crew are safe except Lt. M.J. Cushmanitz (E) who was killed when he bailed out minus his chute.

29

Bingen - Col. Sutton led 36 a/c including two PFF and two Gee H from the 306th as 40 "A". As in Buckeye's message, the target, marshalling yards in the town of Bingen near Western front, was GAVU. The Group's briefed aiming point, however, had been hit by previous formations, and therefore the lead bombardier dropped on an unhit part of the target area. Low hit over due to a rack malfunction. Compact high pattern fell in center of the town. Results of the mission as a whole were described as good.

No enemy fighters were observed. Slight accurate tracking, flak at the target after bombs away caused the following damage: lead, four severe, two slight, one missing, one landed away; low, one slight, one landed away; high, one severe, one slight. Accurate tracking bursts were reported at the front lines both going in and coming out.

Lt. W.J. Davis of 367th and Col. Smythe of the 43rd both landed at Bampton because of severe flak damage.

A/c 091-C, pilot 1st Lt. E.K. McCallum of the 368th, was hit in target area after bombs away. The plane was observed to have one engine smoking as it made wide spirals losing altitude. Some crews saw three chutes. Other members on the aircraft: 2nd Lt. G.J. Pinnels (C), 2nd Lt. T.E. Tollard (H), T/Sgt. F.L. Arnold (B), T/Sgt. G.A. Korf (A), T/Sgt. C.S. Gibbs (TT), Sgt. H.C. Ryberg (ST), Sgt. F.J. Lehnert (M), S/Sgt. T. Day (TU).

Bairn - 306th flew 36 a/c including four PFF as 40 "C" led by Maj. McKinney. The target was the marshalling yard at Bairn, which was covered by 10/10 clouds. Our group attacked on an HX run with unobserved results.

Heavier and inaccurate A.A. damaged no a/c. Enemy fighter opposition was nil.

The old year was ushered out in fine style at the "B" mess where the officers held the group party. There was plenty to drink and eat and good music to which to dance. Hosts who attended, including Col. Sutton, Lt. Col. Chalfant, and Lt. Col. Day, had an excellent time. Music was furnished by the Esquires, the band being studded with local talent. Needless to say, a rousing reception greeted 1945.

Enlisted men on the field celebrated with a similar gala affair held at the Lounge on the night of the 30th.

Sports - Base football team played three games during the month, winning 2 and tying 1. Lt. Howers scored on an intercepted pass to give Thurleigh a 6-6 deadlock with Station 045 in a contest played at Reading, England on the 10th.

The 306th played a friendly match with 040 in Bedford on the 16th when it

**THURLEIGH CRUSHES TARP  
HARRINGTON 25-0, SEVEN  
P.M. DEC. 18**

Spurred by the brilliant broken field running and passing of Weller, the Thurleigh Greenlins crushed the Harrington eleven 25 to 0 before an enthusiastic mixed crowd of GIs and civilians at the Goldington RA Rugby Grounds in Bedford.

In the closing minutes of the first period Weller returned a Harrington punt galloping 60 yds for the first Thurleigh tally. Scoring for the first half ended when Weller tossed a touchdown pass to ev. Vincent. Both attempts at conversion failed.

The waddlers moved toward victory early in the third quarter by a series of short runs culminated by Weller's romp through the Harrington team with the aid of some beautiful blocking for 5 yds and a third touchdown. Thurleigh's last touchdown was tallied on another Weller pass, this time to Lt. Hovens. Weller potted the extra point.
