Month of March, 1944. From Capt. H. W. Glass

DAY	EVENTS
1.	Capt. Hunsel promoted to Major effective 1 March, 1944.
2.	Twenty-six A/O of this Group were airborne and 17 A/O led by Lt. Col. Duskey bombed Frankfurt on 17F through 20/10 overcast. The 306th led the 40th Combat Wing and it is believed our bombs hit the dock area east of town. Fighter escort was excellent, no E/A were seen. Flick at the target was very inaccurate.
3.	Twenty-nine A/O led by Capt. Kirk and Lt. Nally took off for Berlin. Over the North Sea clouds and layers of condensation trails from wings ahead forced this Group to 17,000 feet by the time the German Coast was reached. The Combat Wing Leader elected to return to base. No bombs were dropped, no E/A were seen and only slight A.A. fire was encountered over Hallsland.
4.	Twenty-six of our A/O led by Lt. Col. Roman took off for another try at Berlin. Due to weather and various other factors at rendezvous all of our A/O returned to base except six ships of the 369th Squadron which tagged on to the 306th Group leader and flew high squadron in this formation. Bombs were dropped on the leader through a break in the clouds about five miles S.W. of Bonn. No E/A were seen, A.A. fire was slight and inaccurate, bombing results were unobserved.
6.	Twenty-seven A/O led by Capt. H. D. Thompson took off and twenty-three of them attacked the eastern side of Berlin. Just after the target Lt. C. W. Smith of the 308th was seen to lose altitude under control and later was reported as making a safe landing in Sweden with all members of his crew. Intense, predicted concentrations of A.A. fire came up from the center of the city. Fighter support was reported as wonderful, only 3 or 4 of the 50-odd E/A seen attacked this Group's formation. Our score for the day was 2-1-1.
8.	Twenty-eight A/O led by Maj. Flanagan took off and twenty-six A/O did an excellent job of visual bombing on the Kröner ball bearing works just N.W. of Berlin proper. Flick at the target was moderate but accurate, during the remainder of the journey it was avoided due to excellent navigation. Fighter escort was close and well coordinated. All of our A/O returned to base.
9.	Twenty-one of our A/O led by Capt. Kirk were airborne and 19 A/O attacked Berlin on 17F through 19/10 cloud. No E/A were seen and A.A. fire on this Group was heavier, although an intense barrage came up after

9. (cont'd)	the 40th Combat Wing had left the area. Fighter escort was good to the target, but there were gaps on the return. Later reports showed bombing good.
16.	Thirty-two A/C led by Lt. Col. Lambert took off and 24 A/C bombed Gessarthausen, located 6 miles S.W. of Augsburg, on PFF through 10/10 cloud. No flak at the target but on way out over France moderate accurate A.A. fire was encountered at several places. Fighter cover was good with gaps. No E/A were seen. All of our A/C returned to Base.
18.	We put thirty-four A/C over the target of Leonfeld, led by Lt. Col. Regan, and bombed visually with excellent results on this Nazi A/D. Support was good, A.A. fire slight and no enemy fighters were encountered. The 305th Group flew lead Group, and lead and low Squadrons of the low Group in the 40th Composite Combat Wing. All of our A/C returned to base. Group party at "A" Mess. Only female contingent were individually invited representatives.
20.	Twenty A/C took off as lead Group of the 40th Combat Wing to bomb Frankfurt. Heavy clouds made assembly and navigation difficult. Weather became so bad over the continent that a turn back (near Luxembourg) was necessary. No bombs were dropped, no enemy A/C were seen, but the formation did pass over some bad flak areas resulting in considerable battle damage to our A/C. All ships returned safely to base.
22.	The Group put up thirty-five A/C led by Col. Turner, heading both the CGH and the Division on this mission to Berlin. Because of 10/10 cloud bombs were dropped by PFF on the Friedrichstrasse Station by 29 A/C. Our formation was under fire of the Berlin guns for a full seven minutes. Both barrage and tracking fire were intense and accurate. All of our A/C showed battle damage, 14 seriously. Once again the Luftwaffe refused combat. All of our A/C landed in England.
23.	Twenty-nine A/C dispatched, led by Capt. Malahan, and 27A/C bombed Hamm, Germany, through 8/10 cloud cover. Leaflets were again dropped. A.A. fire was moderate and there were no fighter attacks on our formation. Fighter support was good and all of our A/C returned to Base.
24.	Twenty-one A/C led by Major Salada were dispatched and bombed Frankfurt through 9/10 cloud on PFF equipment with excellent results, later confirmed. No enemy fighters were seen and flak was very inaccurate. All A/C returned safely to Base.

26.	<p><i>jugular vein severed by flak</i></p> <p><b>NOBALL</b> - What had formerly been considered a "milk run" back-fired on this mission. Twenty-five of our 30 A/C dispatched bombed this small target by Squadrons, practically in trail, making a perfect set-up for A.A. gunners. Seventeen of our A/C received serious battle damage. Lt. Barney H. Price of the 369th Squadron and crew failed to return, bombardier F/O R.J. Giesse of the 369th Squadron was killed and there were many injuries from flak among various crew members. No E/A were seen and area support was good.</p>
27.	<p>Twenty-one A/C dispatched led by Lt. Col. Lambert and 18 A/C attacked the A/C, workshops, and barracks near La Rochelle. Perfect weather plus excellent navigation plus no enemy opposition resulted in a solid pattern of bombs on the H.P.I. Every building seemed to receive direct hits. Lt. E. C. Fix of the 368th Squadron was lost on this mission, but not due to enemy action.</p>
28.	<p><b>Dijon/Laurens A/C.</b> One more airframe and training field was wiped out today. Twenty of the 21 A/C dispatched, led by Lt. Lund, attacked this target through clear skies and excellent results. No E/A were seen, and there was no flak at the target. All of our A/C returned to Base.</p>
29.	<p><b>Brunswick.</b> Eighteen of 21 A/C taking off and led by Capt. Heap bombed the target on PFF through overcast. Escort was good on the way in and A.A. fire was moderately accurate at the target. A 20-minute gap in fighter support shortly after bombs away brought on a vicious enemy attack in force. Lts. Schuering and Haywood of the 369th Squadron were shot down and Lt. Hardin of the 423rd Squadron was badly damaged and when last seen was over Holland. Many crew members were injured. Lt. G. L. Barnack, navigator, and Sgt. V. F. Jenison, tail gunner, of the 367th Squadron were killed. Our score of the day was 1 - 0 - 0.</p>
<b>NOTE:</b>	<p>This month has marked a record in several respects; first, in the number of missions flown (16), then the daylight bombing of Berlin, and the small number (three) of enemy A/C destroyed. The long-rumored increase of the tour of duty from 25 to 30 missions was put into effect.</p>
