06/26/2003 ETHAN A. ALLEN SR. MORRISVILLE - Ethan A. Allen Sr., 84, of Morrisville, formerly of South Burlington, passed away Tuesday, June 24, 2003, in Copley Hospital. Born on the family farm on Randolph Road in Morristown on Feb. 1, 1919, he was the son of Lee S. Allen and Nina Wilkinson Allen. He graduated from Peoples Academy in 1936. He served in the U.S. Army Air Corps during World War II as a B-17 pilot. He was assigned to Bomber Group 306, Squadron 369, at Thurleigh, England. He completed 34 missions during the war and was awarded the Air Medal with three oak-leaf clusters, the Distinguished Flying Cross and an ETO ribbon with three battle stars. He was employed by New England Telephone & Telegraph for 30 years, having worked as a lineman, a foreman and as the Vermont safety supervisor, and held a position in personnel before retiring. He was a member of the First Congregational Church of Burlington, the Telephone Pioneers, a 50-year member of Mount Vernon Lodge 8, F&AM, of Morrisville, and a member of the South Burlington Kiwanis Club. He and Marge volunteered at the Possibility Shop at the First Congregational Church in Burlington. Ethan enjoyed the outdoors of Vermont through hunting, stream fishing and ice fishing. He became an avid golfer with a group of friends at Wilcox Cove after his retirement. He is survived by his wife of 62 years, Margaret D. Allen; two sons, Ethan A. "Skip" Allen Jr. and his wife, Carol, of Williston, and Douglas E. Allen of Arlington, Va.; a sister-in-law, Jeanne H. Allen of Morrisville; four grandchildren, Kevin C. Allen, Christopher D. Allen, Cynthia M. Allen and Lee Allen. In addition to his parents, he was predeceased by a brother, Lynwood L. Allen, and three sisters, Louise A. Smith, Winona A. Campbell, and Evelyn A. Bridge. Funeral services will be held Saturday, June 28, at 11 a.m. in the First Congregational Church in Morrisville. Interment will follow in Pleasant View Cemetery. A reception for all friends and family will be held at Hilary's Restaurant, Northgate Plaza in Morrisville, following the interment.
