8/45 when I finally got rotated
with 111 points. I from about
6/42 however I was in S-2
which was a group function. Brit.

Lee May was OPS officer in Puddleton

Dear Russell

Last Fall, I believe around October I sent for your book "First over Germany" and received it promptly for which I thank you. - I can't tell you how much I enjoyed the retelling of 306th experience. Thank you again. - To identify myself, I was in Group S-2 (Assigned for admin. to the 369th) as S/Sgt in J A Bairnsfather's gang. I put many of those horrible black strings reaching into Germany ~~and the~~ on the briefing map. I was in that group of 50 men who came from Pendleton Field on Palm Sunday weekend 1942. First Sgts, Men Sgts, Supply Sgts, cooks etc. I was a lowly PFC who happened to be able to type. Later that spring Major Watts Humphrey requested my transfer to S-2.

Your book received many memories (2) of the early days. We were first assigned to tents in "Tent City". Two (2) of my tentmates were Wilson Elliott & Clyde Bennett, both of whom were early PW casualties. The war must have been a terribly long ordeal for them. I'm delighted to see that Wilson Elliott is active in the reunion effort. I hope he remembers me. - Our acquaintance was so brief!

Another episode that touched me was the fate of Chas. Crammers plane with Arizona Harris' heroic feats. The image of the top turret guns still firing, as the plane is sinking in the Channel is a very difficult image, until you remember the red hair and freckles, and the most intimidating lower jaw I have ever seen. I was one of the four (4) ground personnel in the air echelon from Woodover to Westover assigned to Lt. Crammers plane. Again my contact with these people was very brief but memorable. Such fine men, A.T., Kermit Constantine, Harry Messers, etc.

I remember as we were flying in the (3) area near Chicago, the navigator was asked for ETA. He said "about midnight" - I remember we touched down at Westover at 12:01 - My esteem for the flight personnel rose immeasurably.

Harry Meyers (waist gun) did not go on that fateful mission (I don't remember why) but was so unhappy that he didn't go. I suppose he thought he could have made a difference.

Cliff Langley, a good buddy from Wendover days, volunteered for gunner when they added a second waist gunner. Unfortunately he was in the tail when he got hit in Rip Roideam plane. I went down to the Oxford hosp. to visit him a few days after and he was his old joking self. - I was able to retrieve his helmet from Tech Supply and the steel spring strap in the helmet was severed by a .7.9 bullet. A very interesting souvenir for Cliff. I regret having lost track of him.

These close contacts, however brief, with these great guys left me with a feeling of being a Jonah. — I finally concluded that it was best that the flight crew (EM anyhow) were billeted separately from the ground personnel.

I am looking forward to Dayton. I'd like to look you up. Bob Crane too. — He was the only real soldier in the 369th. — I have some very interesting souvenirs that may be of interest to the Historian. If not, Gordon Richards should get them. — When I was there (Thurlough) in May 1985, He said "The history of the 306th was here in England, not in the U.S." — I certainly hope he too, will be at Dayton. It was a pleasure to meet and chat with you at Dayton, my first reunion. Certainly not my last. I thank you for the stuff returned to me, I assumed that you would retain it for your archives or whatever.

I thank you again for renewing the contact with Cliff Langley. (He keeps thanking me and I presume has thanked you. The thanks really belong to your VA friend) Cliff & I have corresponded via letter, cassette, and phone. In his last letter he sent me the enclosed INTELLIGENCE REPORT which I believe is a fine subject for inclusion in the 306th ECHOES. I remember in an early issue I read that you did not want to hear all the stories because you have heard them all. However, I believe that surviving 4 separate wounds and still shooting down

He said he would visit Thurleigh & look up Gordon Richards. He estimated, from his schedule that he would be at Thurleigh on Dec 12th which was the 1942 date of what he calls his rebirth. A remarkable coincidence! Gordon Richards will flip.

Now, that was in January and he had died the previous June. In the meantime, she had received two copies of Echoes, and perhaps the directory, without letting us know about, so I don't feel any great responsibility.

It is unfortunate, and I talked to a widow just recently whose husband had died three years ago and she had just not gotten around to letting us know.

There seems to be no definite pattern to such things. Some take care of it expeditiously and others are just too overwhelmed to handle such matters very well.

Don't give up calling, though, because the rewards of finding people and talking with old friends far outway the few who have passed away or who only want to gripe about their time with the 306th.

Dear Russell

Thank you for your note about bringing Capt. Outwros into the organization. I'm sure he will be pleased.

I was wrong in the date of April 9th as my arrival at Wendover. It was April 6th 1942 as noted in your book, when 50 ^{came} men from the 34th B.G. in Pendleton.

I was drafted on Feb 7 in N.Y. 2 days later in Jefferson Barracks in MO. - then Pendleton for 4 weeks.

The 34th - was a training command and was moving recruits in daily and shipping Travel men out daily. My job was to type a complete roster daily reflecting all changes.

I remember joining the group of 50 men going to Wendover,

The only memories I have of that is: 1) It was a holiday weekend (Palm Sunday) and the rest of the train was full of beautiful girls on their way to Sun Valley for skiing. 2) I think I was the only private in our group, the rest being privates, techs, staff sergeants with a few corporals. It was a cadre of trained people. At Wendover other than the base personnel everyone was a private just out of school, or basic training. The people from Pendleton were 1st Sgts, Supply Sgts, Tech-Supply, Mess Sgts, and a few Line chiefs. George Atoms could give you better info on this as he was with the 34 B.G. from Wendover days.

The 1st Sgt for 369th Sq. (3)
for example was Francis Hedham
who in several weeks or so left
for D.C.S. Our Supply Sgt was Wm.
Bippus no longer on our address file
T/Sgt JACK VALUZZO was Tech Supply
M/Sgt ARTHUR HARNOLD was here Chief
Sgt JOHN SANUTH was Men Sgt.
Cpl ANTOVS, PVT KENNEDY were
Cooks. - The other squadrons got
their share of personnel in key positions.

I'm sorry to be of so little help.
Incidentally you said at San Anton.
that you were interested in putting
some names to a photo of 52
Officers.
And, I promised a write up on
TORCH & the FOUR HORSEMEN. You
should have it in a month or so.

I am enjoying more and ⁽⁴⁾more the reunions. San Antonio was one of the best. Even Anne is looking forward to them.

I'll see you in the yearbook.

About Lt. Brunting. - I have a startling bit of news. - I verified that his name did not appear on the "Wall of Missing". I went to the office and inquired why this was so. Their record (Xerox attached) shows he is buried in Brittany! No further information was available.

I did verify the names of Lt Cranmer, Sgt K. Constantine and A.T. Harris, these were the only names I could remember. I do not have the list of all names on the Wall of Missing. Could you check the list for the other crew members: -

I got in touch with J. W. Hair in Texas who was Cranmer's mechanic on our Trip from Woodover to Westover. He was pleased to hear from me, but could not add anything. In fact by the time of the last mission Hair was on F. Goodwill's crew.

Before pursuing this matter further will you verify the list of 6 names above are on the list of Missing. If not they may have come to the same fate as Lt. Brunsting, whatever that was.

If the Maddingly Cemetery has all this info wouldn't all the Cemeteries have it? Like Arlington, etc.

If you have any other ideas for follow-up I'll be glad to hear them. Until I hear about the 6 names above I'll wait. The possibilities are intriguing. Thank you Lerf H.

I compared your list of six names and found that Charles Wall, John Reed, Paul Byer and William Musick are indeed listed on The Wall of the Missing at Madingley.

That leaves Robert Ransom and Edgar Whittaker unaccounted for.

I am enclosing copies of my reference cards on these two men, although I note that you caught the variant spelling of Whittaker's last name. The serial numbers might be helpful in verifying the correct data.

Let me know what you can find out. I know that we have men buried in Luxembourg, in the Netherlands and on the Brest peninsula. Let me know any pertinent data concerning other burials that you come up with.

Gentlemen:

I am sending this request for information which I hope you can satisfy. I attended the 50th anniversary of the arrival in England of the 306th Bombardment Group. Part of our reunion ceremonies included a visit to the American Cemetery in Cambridge.

It was there that I found that four (4) of our men who were missing were in fact, buried in Brittany, France. They are:

Lt. Albert Brunsting - copilot
Sgt. Charles S. Wall - gunner
Sgt. Robert L Ransom, gunner
Sgt. Edgar G. Whittaker, gunner

These men were members of Lt. Charles W. B. Cranmer's crew. Their B-17 was shot down in the English Channel 40 miles northwest of Brest on their return from a raid on St. Nazaire, January 3, 1943. Intelligence reports for that mission tell that the plane went into the water under constant attack and the top-turret guns were still firing as the plane sank. No parachutes were observed.

My questions are:

1. How were the men recovered from 40 miles from land?
2. Was death from exposure or wounds?
3. How and when did they get to Brittany?

The Battleground Monument Association in Washington, D.c. has told me that you probably have a "Personnel File" on all who are buried in Brittany. In that event I would appreciate any pertinent photocopies from those files.

My personal interest in this crew is due to being assigned with them during travel from Utah to England in the late summer of 1942. The Secretary/Historian of the 306th B.G. Assn. is also interested and I will forward everything to him.

Dear Lief:

Many thanks for the clippings on Victor Spevak. That makes writing an obituary so much easier.

A year or so ago, while wondering what to do with the obits from all kinds of people, some short, some long, I discovered that I could copy many of them on the back of my 3x5 file cards, which I did with Victor's. In this way I have a permanent record, and don't add another piece of paper to my files. And, when I copy that card file every three years or so, that permanent record appears on the microfilm.

The Association provided me with a small copier, hand fed, and I have found that while it would be nice to be able to run it automatic, that it really serves my purposes better for all kinds of things than a bigger model might. And, I certainly don't want two copies around--lack of good space.

Had to stop writing to move a sprinkler. We are trying hard in this daily 90-95 degree heat to keep our trees and shrubbery alive, and usually water heavily every morning and evening. And I just noticed that a small shrub that has been watered may not make it.

Now I am hurrying to finish up the 368th Combat Diary so that it too can go to Seattle. Looks Like I ought to make it to the printer by about 10 August, which is plenty of time. But, I'll also have to order some additional 367th diaries in order to have some to take with me.

Mr. Leif Henry Hansen, 81, formerly of Crestwood Village, Frederick, MD, and more recently of Arlington, VA, died on Wednesday, June 17 at the Arlington Hospital. He was the husband of the late Anne Amanda Hoffman Hansen, who died Sep 10, 1997.

Born June 24, 1916, in Tonsberg, Norway, he was a son of the late Hans and Olga K. Nelson Hansen. Mr. Hansen immigrated to the United States in Nov 1920, with his mother, and after entering thru Ellis Island, settled after several months with his family in Elizabeth, NJ, where he remained until they moved to Queens, NY. He received his early education in the New York area, and enlisted in the U.S. Army, serving with the 369th Bomb Squadron, 306th Bombardment Group, 8th Air Force, E.T.O., until his discharge in 1945.
